PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

MONDAY

AM **Leading in a Crisis** **Session 401**
This seminar focuses on how we can best deal with a very difficult circumstance and effectively move forward.

PM **The VUCA Environment – Volatility, Uncertainty, Chaos, and Ambiguity**
This seminar focuses on the VUCA Environment and what new skills we, as professionals, are going to need to work effectively in that environment.

2012 IRC Advanced Wood Wall Bracing **Session 411**
This seminar provides a comprehensive explanation of the IRC bracing requirements. This seminar will focus on **advanced** requirements and clarify the application of wall bracing provisions in IRC Sections R602.10 thru R602.12.

Finish Details and Townhouse Requirements of the 2012 IRC

Session 412

This seminar will cover interior and exterior finish parameters of the IRC that include window, siding and roofing installations and the related flashings required. The afternoon portion will cover dwelling separation requirements that include listed designs, continuity, and penetrations as well as fire separation distance provisions for projections and overhangs.

Roof to Soil – Structural Design and Inspection

Session 413

This seminar will provide an overview in identifying and calculating live and dead loads from roof to soil displacement. Instructor will cover evaluations of truss/rafter, beams/headers, point loads, walls, floors and foundation systems from plan review to actual built environment. A review of fasteners and connectors will also be included. Attendees should bring a calculator and a current IRC.

AM Residential Deck Construction

Session 414

Seminar attendees will receive a wide spectrum of information needed to determine minimum requirements for deck construction. Participants will have the opportunity to review new and old code sections, as well as partake in practical application scenarios. This seminar will be of interest to architects, design professionals, contractors, code enforcers and plan reviewers. Content covered in this seminar includes, but is not limited to:

- Basic questions to ask with the deck application
- The mechanics of wood used in deck construction
- How to size joists, beams, posts, and piers
- Proper specification and use of fasteners
- Reviewing construction documents and site plans for permitting process

PM Moisture Intrusion

This seminar will provide fundamental information of IRC exterior weather barrier provisions (walls, roof and foundation) related to moisture intrusion from a permit and inspection perspective. Topics include exterior wall envelope weather-barrier components, roofing assembly components and foundations.

Session 415

MONDAY

2012 IBC Fire and Smoke Protection Features

Session 421

This seminar addresses the critical concepts of the 2012 *International Building Code*® regarding Chapter 7, Fire and Smoke Protection Features. These concepts provide a basis for the analysis and identification of which components require fire-resistance ratings; where fire-resistance-rated construction is required in building construction; where smoke-resistant construction is mandated; and the use of fire door assemblies, fire window assemblies, penetration firestop systems, fire dampers and smoke dampers.

2012 IBC Inspection of Fire-Resistance-Rated Walls, Floors, Ceilings and Roofs **Session 422**
This seminar deals with the application of IBC Chapter 7 related to the construction and protection of rated walls and horizontal assemblies. Topics covered include identifying the five types of walls and their differences, understanding the differences between floor, floor/ceiling and roof/ceiling assemblies, as well as the protection requirements for penetrations, joint systems, duct and air transfer openings, and door and window openings. Additional discussion will look at test standards used to evaluate the assembly and protection systems and how those protections are limited or could be compromised if not installed as tested.

2012 IECC Performing Residential Energy Plan Reviews **Session 441**
This seminar addresses numerous provisions of the 2012 *International Energy Conservation Code*® where the code contains requirements applicable to residential construction. This seminar is intended to help plan reviewers or building officials responsible for plan review identify those areas where plan review will include compliance with the IECC.

2012 IBC Accessibility and Usability for Residential Facilities **Session 432**
This seminar focuses on the minimum requirements for new or existing construction of accessible residential facilities for compliance with the 2012 *International Building Code*® and ICC A117.1-2009 *Accessible and Usable Buildings and Facilities*. This seminar addresses the design, plan review and inspection of residential buildings to ensure that people with physical, visual and hearing impairments can use the facilities.

Session 443

This seminar will introduce critical concepts of the 2012 *International Existing Building Code*[®], and will provide a basis for the correct use and application of the code. It will build an understanding of the intent of the code through detailing basic tables, categorizations and case studies.

AM Structural Changes to the 2012 IBC

Session 434

This seminar is an overview of the significant structural changes to the 2012 *International Building Code*[®] and referenced standards. Topics include load combinations, live loads, determination of wind load, wind and seismic maps, atmospheric ice loads, special inspection, and ACI 318 modifications.

PM 2012 IBC Wood-Framed Shear Walls

This seminar discusses the purpose of shear walls and reviews their design and use in light-frame wood construction using the 2012 *International Building Code* and 2012 *National Design Standard (NDS)*. Topics include shear wall design, diaphragms, chords, collectors and anchorage, and determining when prescriptive braced wall panels vs. engineered shear walls are used.

2012 IBC Special Use and Occupancy

Session 444

This seminar provides an overview of the 2012 *International Building Code*[®] Chapter 4 provisions and the application of the code requirements for various uses and occupancies that are addressed in that chapter, including: requirements for buildings and conditions that apply to one or more occupancy groups, such as high-rise buildings, underground buildings and atriums; specific areas and operations, including hazardous materials, application of flammable finishes, drying rooms, organic coatings, combustible storage and hydrogen cutoff rooms; special use areas, such as covered mall buildings, motor-vehicle-related occupancies, special amusement buildings and aircraft-related occupancies; special facilities within other occupancies, such as stages and platforms, motion picture projection rooms and storm shelters; and unique considerations for Groups H, I and R, as well as ambulatory care facilities and live/work units.

Wisconsin Commercial Building Code (WCBC) Refresher

Session 435

This seminar will provide an update of the WI Uniform Dwelling and Commercial Building Codes with a focus on the changes that have taken place between the previous versions of both the UDC and the WCBC. Topics include update on the most current details associated with the Dept. of Safety and Professional Services, administrative changes to the UDC and WCBC, significant changes to each code, refresher on energy conservation, HVAC, plumbing, electrical and accessibility provisions applicable to each code.

MONDAY**Tents, Canopies, Clear Span Structures and Stages****Session 451**

In 2011, six people died in Indiana during a stage collapse. In 2012, 100 people were injured in St. Louis outside a bar when the tent was picked up by wind. Outdoor events are becoming more popular every year. There is more to tent and stage inspections than covered in Chapter 24 of the *International Fire Code* or Chapter 31 of the *International Building Code*. Keep your jurisdiction from being a statistic. Attendees will learn code requirements as well as where and what to look for with engineered systems. Lastly, several case studies will be reviewed to see where things went wrong.

TUESDAY**All You Need to Know about the Minnesota State Fire Code Section 907****Session 452**

The State of MN highly amends Section 907 of the *Minnesota State Fire Code*. This seminar provides an in-depth review of the latest safety provisions related to fire alarm, detection, signaling and emergency communication demands. The building and fire code requirements based on occupancy classification for automatic and manual systems and other provisions related to fire alarms will be presented.

WEDNESDAY**NFPA 13D Made Easy****Session 453**

This seminar will provide attendees with a working knowledge of the design concepts, code requirements and inspection considerations applicable to residential fire sprinkler systems. The presentation will include unique hazards of today's residential fire environment; differences between dedicated versus multipurpose plumbing/sprinkler systems; sprinkler system layout and pipe sizing; options for piping materials; using a well as a water supply; installations in freezing climates; and other related topics. Lastly, attendees will design and calculate their own 13D system.

THURSDAY**IBC Means of Egress for Fire Officials****Session 454**

This seminar presents a basic overview of the means of egress (MOE) requirements included in the IBC and IFC. Topics include the three parts of the MOE, including occupant loads, egress width, number of exits, travel distance, common path of egress travel and exit enclosures. This seminar will also include the maintenance of the MOE and how fire officials are involved in enforcing the requirements.

FRIDAY**Cross Laminated Timber and its Place in Building Construction****Session 445**

This seminar will present the full spectrum of fire-resistance-rated wood construction including: light frame, heavy timber, and examples of mass timber being utilized and proposed for the construction of buildings well beyond traditional IBC wood height and area limits. Review of IBC Chapters 5, 6 and 7 topics will include: types of construction, allowable area, required separations, fire-resistance-rated walls and horizontal assemblies, concealed spaces, prescriptive and calculated fire resistance and their organization structure found in the IBC. The fire behavior of mass timber and CLT will be discussed along with answers to a long list of frequently asked CLT questions.

2012 UPC Essentials Workshop

Session 461

This seminar provides a fundamental understanding of the 2012 *Uniform Plumbing Code*[®]. This seminar offers attendees an opportunity to learn the basics of the 2012 UPC. Each chapter is covered and supplies the “need to know” information required to successfully understand and apply the provisions of that chapter. The 2012 UPC includes a total revision to Chapter 16 and new Chapter 17 that will be highlighted in this seminar.

Also covered are the nuances, applications, and limitations of all hydronic components, including the different types of boilers and their applications, ground source heat pumps and their limitations, as well as compatibility between the different heat sources and methodologies for distribution.






