APPRENTICESHIP MINNESOTA PARTNERS WITH WORKFORCE BOARDS

Over the past year, Apprenticeship Minnesota hosted a training series for workforce development boards across the state.

The first half of the training included a three-part webinar series that provided an in-depth look at the registered apprenticeship system in Minnesota and detailed best practices for collaboration between the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)-related services and the registered apprenticeship programs.

The second half of the training series included four in-person meetings that provided local workforce development boards time to plan and implement a registered apprenticeship strategy for their local area.

GALLARDO FINDS A DREAM CAREER THROUGH BUILDING STRONG COMMUNITIES AND APPRENTICESHIP

From repetitive warehouse work to dreaming of operating cranes — Melanie Gallardo made a bold move toward a career she loves through registered apprenticeship.

Gallardo recently completed the 2025 Building Strong Communities (BSC) program, a 12-week apprenticeship preparatory program. The program provides a construction industry overview, craft-specific curriculum and hands-on exposure to the trades. Participants choose a trade of interest where they can spend time focused on a particular craft.

While in the BSC program, Gallardo participated in the International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) Local 49's four-week Apprenticeship Readiness Training to get hands-on experience in her trade of interest.

"I wanted something fun that wasn't indoors. I liked heavy equipment," she said.

With support from IUOE Local 49 and BSC, she discovered confidence, connection and a future filled with possibility. "It's like brotherhood, sisterhood — people who've got your back," Gallardo said.

Now that she is a registered first-year apprentice, her message to anyone feeling stuck is: "There is so much more to the trades. Just try it. You never know what you'll discover."

BSC received a Labor Education Advancement Program grant to help increase the participation and/or retention of people of color, Indigenous people and women in registered apprenticeship programs.

FUNDING FOR APPRENTICESHIP OUTREACH TO STUDENTS AVAILABLE

The Introduction to Registered Apprenticeship for Educators grant program provides funding for the purpose of introducing Minnesota high school staff and students to registered apprenticeship.

Grant funding can be used to help cover costs related to presentations and transportation to events or activities focused on registered apprenticeship. This program is 100% funded by a State Apprenticeship Expansion Formula – Competitive grant from the U.S. Department of Labor/Employment and Training Administration.



WELDING COMPETITION HIGHLIGHTS SKILLED TRADES PATHWAYS

On April 30, 2025, Local 6 Plumbers and Pipefitters hosted their third annual Southeastern Minnesota High School Welding Competition. The event brought together over 170 high school students from area welding programs.

The competition attracted a total turnout of close to 600 students, including competitors and spectators. This participation provided an opportunity to educate local students about the job opportunities available in the welding trade.

"We have a lot of area high schoolers that are looking for a hands-on career. They want to get out there, they want a job that's physical, where they can use their hands," said Jeremy Thompson, Local 6 training coordinator. "This is a great way to earn a good living and there are tons of opportunities here for the kids to learn about."

A career fair was also part of the event, where local trade unions, employers and technical colleges met with students. The fair aimed to discuss opportunities and entry points into hands-on careers.

This year's winners, the Byron Bears welding team, saw Gavin Bartel, of Byron, Minnesota, winner of the individual competition, go on to join the Plumbers

Local 6 apprenticeship program where he is currently working as a first-year apprentice.
